My dear Senator Harry:

I am enclosing a copy of a letter I received regarding a boy I am trying to take out of Vienna. He already has the necessary affidavit and visa which were approved by the American Consul in Vienna. He is a very fine, harmless boy, a very high type of person. But he was taken prisoner from the streets of Vienna and put in a concentration camp. I am enclosing a copy of the letter I received from his sister in Paris.

My dear Senator, I would be very grateful to you if you will communicate with the American Consul in Vienna and see that the boy is taken from the concentration camp and allowed to proceed, in view of the fact that he already has the necessary papers which have been approved; so he can either get to his sister in Paris, or come in my care to Kansas City.

My dear Harry, please advise me regarding this. It is the first request for help I have ever asked you.


